2019/20 ANNUAL REPORT

The 2019/20 season marked a year unlike any other. From moving trucks to partnerships, the season was one for the record books.

We had our first season of ART on Tour, and we moved from our home at 1515 Morrison to our temporary office space at Zidell Yards. The first stop of ART on Tour was Imago Theatre in SE Portland for 1984 by Robert Icke and Duncan MacMillian, directed by Dámaso Rodríguez. Audiences remarked that they "forgot reality for a moment, they were so tuned into the play" and felt as if it was "one of the best plays I've ever seen." From Imago, it was a quick jaunt through SE and over Tilikum Crossing to the Portland Opera's Hampton Center, for La Ruta by Isaac Gomez, directed by Dámaso Rodríguez. Patrons were visibly moved to tears and felt like they "witnessed a powerful performance by top talent." Winter hit and we traveled through the snow over to the Tiffany Center in SW Portland for *The Strange Undoing of Prudencia Hart* by David Greig, directed by Luan Schooler and Dámaso Rodríguez. Audiences "had no idea it would be this fun" and felt that "it was a brilliant, energetic romp!" We dipped further into the NW Pearl District for our co-production with Portland Center Stage on School Girls; or The African Mean Girls Play by Jocelyn Bioh, directed by Lava Alapai. The play hit hard and was "funny, biting, and well worth seeing." Spring brought a stroll further up to PSU's Lincoln Hall, the home for our co-production with Profile Theatre in association with Portland State University, Paula Vogel's Indecent, directed by Josh Hecht. Patrons leapt to their feet every night saying this production "brought the magic" and was "spectacular" and "absolutely beautiful!"

And then there was March.

We had to postpone our Magic of Theatre Gala and our final production of the season, Anthony Hudson's Looking for *Tiger Lily*. We all sheltered in place, made banana bread, and tried to keep our sanity during the constant Zoom meetings. We stood with many Portlanders as the nation had mass protests and demanded that Black Lives Matter.

And even though we had an uncertain future for when we could gather together again, we launched the first Mercury Company and hired 52 actors, writers, designers, directors, and other creatives to work on 12 projects. ART ventured into new mediums and forged new trails. We did internal audits and took the time disconnected from the stage to push for and make positive changes within our organization. To lead the field in content creation and lean into the transformational structural changes we knew we needed to make. To create an anti-racist theatre, because when we choose to be anti-racist, we become actively conscious about race and take actions to end racial inequities in our daily lives. So we do what we do best. We illuminate bold new voices and bold new work. We produce work. We make work. We make ART.

Table|Room|Stage (T|R|S) is Artists Rep's creative laboratory for new theatrical works. Persistently inclusive, T|R|S supports works that vividly express ART's values and surprise with their imagination, integrity, and tale to tell.

IN THE 19/20 SEASON, ART INCLUDED TWO T|R|S PRODUCTIONS:

La Ruta, Isaac Gomez's harrowing drama about the missing and murdered women of Juárez received additional development and a critical second production following its premiere at Chicago's Steppenwolf Theatre in 2018.

Looking for Tiger Lily by Anthony Hudson (Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde), a T|R|S commission was slated to open in May. The production was suspended by the pandemic and will be revived when possible. **2019/20 also included commissions** with Linda Alper (*Shanghai*), Anthony Hudson (*Looking for Tiger Lily*), Dael Orlandersmith (*Shades Between Two Worlds*), Steve Rathje (*Signs*), and Lacroute Playwright-In-Residence, Andrea Stolowitz (*Recent Unsettling Events*), a new project with E.M. Lewis was launched: *The Great Divide*, a co-commission between ART and Oregon Shakespeare Festival's American Revolutions program.

E.M. Lewis was awarded an Andrew W. Mellon National Playwright Residency at Artist Rep. Joining Lacroute Playwright-In-Residence, Andrea Stolowitz, Lewis will be part of ART's artistic staff 2020-2023.

In June 2020, ART responded to the pandemic* by creating the Mercury Company – employing 50+ artists

for a compressed period of time to generate new works that explore theatrical experiences and forms suitable to this uniquely disrupted time. Artists are among the groups most disproportionately impacted* by the pandemic, and ART used the federal Payroll Protection Program funds to help over fifty artists maintain their livelihood and create exciting new works.

Artists Rep believes in the power of theatre helping people make sense of the world and to continue to explore new ways of mutual understanding. Education is woven into the very fabric of theatre, and during the 2019/20 season, we offered free student matinees and workshops, post show discussions, panel discussions, dramaturgy for audience members, and over 50 classes.

In addition to student matinees, ART offered workshops to middle and high school classrooms. Our teaching artists are professional actors, directors, and educators with vast K-12 and college-level teaching experience. We are invested in reducing barriers for schools by offering programming within school walls or in the virtual classroom.

During the 2019/20 season, we launched our Playwriting-in-Schools program led by ART Resident Artist and Mellon Foundation Playwright-in-Residence E.M. Lewis. This program is designed to teach students the art of playwriting and storytelling, including the opportunity to develop their own script from start to finish. The goal of the program is to amplify student voices, to empower students to tell their own stories, and to build self-esteem, empathy, critical thinking skills, advocacy skills, and resilience.

ART partners with multiple community organizations to engage artists and audiences beyond the performance, including the Multnomah County Library, Hollywood Theatre, Pacific University, and Oregon Psychoanalytic Center.

The ArtsHub was created to provide a cultural center that supports Portland's rich artistic ecosystem. Programs and services included deeply discounted rates for rehearsal and meeting space; shared administrative workspace for individuals and organizations; and production services such as set construction, scenic painting, and professional technical support from design through performance. Our main goal is to help a diverse range of arts and community organizations thrive. We prioritize artists and organizations that support ART's values of equity, diversity, and inclusion, and seek to provide a home for a diverse community of artists and audiences to take creative risks. While the program's origin six years ago was in response to an opportunity to share underutilized performance space, we have found that the most vital and lasting impact of the ArtsHub is the bustling community that has formed, and the myriad ways it has led to the empowerment of local artists and the accelerated growth of participating organizations.

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On any given day, staff members and dozens of artists from multiple arts and community organizations are rehearsing, utilizing administrative support and meeting spaces, with chance encounters in shared spaces leading to increased communication and unanticipated future collaborations between organizations. Our new facility is being designed so that the ArtsHub can include even more organizations than it currently serves.



RISE: THE CAMPAIGN FOR ARTISTS REPERTORY THE

As Portland's oldest professional theatre, we are master storytellers and have a legacy of producing acclaimed regional and world premieres. ART's downtown block was originally an Elks Lodge health club. Our building has truly reached the end of its useful life. Sections of the building lacked heat, the roof leaked, and the only way to move from the ground floor to the top floor was by climbing a staircase or by circling the block on the sidewalk.

Clearly, the reinvention of our building is a priority. A \$7.1 million gift in 2018 kicked off our capital campaign, paid off our mortgage, and catalyzed the sale of the north half of the downtown block in July of 2019 to Wood Partners for \$9 million. Wood Partners will be building the Alta Art Tower - 22 stories with 304 one-, two-, and three-bedroom apartments. This is one of the first buildings to be built under Portland's new inclusionary zoning rules - ten percent of the apartments will be rented at 60 percent of median income for sixty years. The \$9 million received in the sale becomes the lead investment for reimagining our remaining building on the south half of the block, in which the roof and a massive wood beam will rise to create a modern multiuse performing arts center with two theatres, four rehearsal halls, and collaborative spaces. We are working with an extraordinary design team - Lever Architecture, Fisher Dachs Theatre Design Consultants, Howard S. Wright contractors, and Shiels Obletz Johnsen as our owner's representative.

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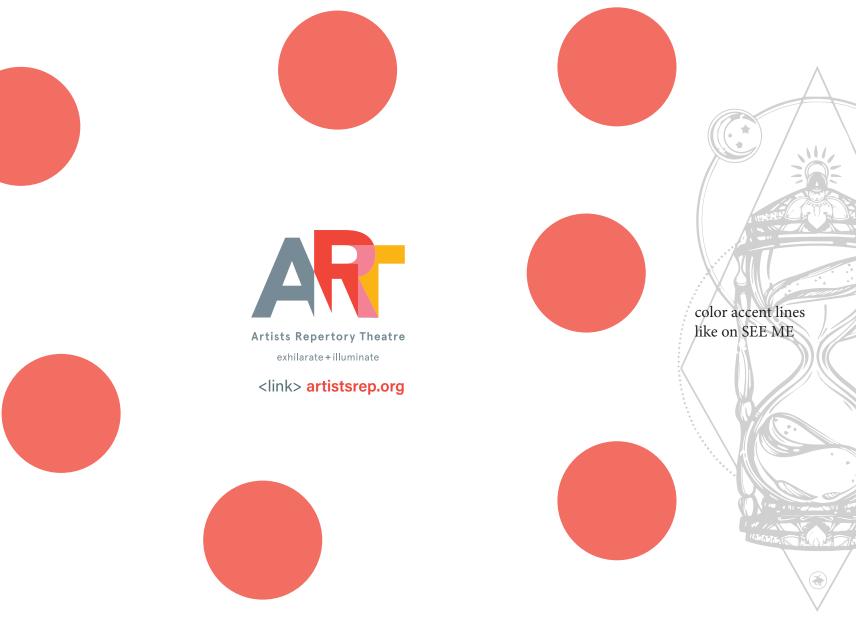
